Dangerous and prohibited goods may not be carried in passenger baggage for safety and security reasons.

Only allowed in carry-on baggage and passenger cabin



Spare batteries / power banks



E-cigarettes



Heat-producing articles



One lighter or one small box of matches

Prohibited in checked baggage and carry-on (cabin) baggage



Fireworks / sparklers



Oxygen cylinders



Oxidising/corrosive Substances



Tasers



Gasoline / fuel Paste



Camping gas



Paint / alcohol > 70%



Poison/household chemicals



Battery-powered transport devices



Radioactive material

Prohibited in carry-on (cabin) baggage



Weapons/ammunition



Sharp/pointed objects



Blunt instruments

DANGEROUS AND PROHIBITED GOODS ON BOARD OF AVCON JET AIRCRAFT

In accordance with Regulation (EC) 2015/1998 of 5 November 2015 to establish detailed measures for the implementation of the Commission's common basic standards on aviation security – 4. PASSENGERS AND CABIN BAGGAGE, 4.4 Prohibited articles – passengers must not (according to Attachment 4-C) carry the following articles into security restricted areas or on board an aircraft:

(a) guns, firearms and other devices that discharge projectiles – devices capable, or appearing capable, of being used to cause serious injury by discharging a projectile, including:

- firearms of all types, such as pistols, revolvers, rifles, shotguns
- toy guns, replicas and imitation firearms capable of being mistaken for real weapons
- component parts of firearms, excluding telescopic sights
- compressed air or CO2 guns, such as pistols, pellet guns, rifles and ball bearing guns
- signal flare pistols and starter pistols
- bows, cross bows and arrows
- harpoon guns and spear guns
- slingshots and catapults

(b) stunning devices – devices designed specifically to stun or immobilise, including:

- devices for shocking, such as stun guns, tasers and stun batons
- animal stunners and animal killers
- disabling and incapacitating chemicals, gases and sprays, such as mace, pepper sprays, capsicum sprays, tear gas, acid sprays and animal repellent sprays

(c) objects with a sharp point or sharp edge – objects with a sharp point or sharp edge capable of being used to cause serious injury, including:

- items designed for chopping, such as axes, hatchets and cleavers
- ice axes and ice picks
- razor blades
- box cutters
- knives with blades of more than 6 cm scissors with blades of more than 6 cm measured from the fulcrum
- material arts equipment with a sharp point or sharp edge
- swards and sabres

(d) workmen's tools – tools capable of being used either to cause serious injury or to threaten the safety of aircraft, including:

- crowbars
- drills and drill bits, including cordless portable power drills
- tools with a blade or a shaft of more than 6 cm capable of use as a weapon, such as screwdrivers and chisels
- saws, including cordless portable power saws
- blowtorches
- bolt guns and nail guns

(e) blunt instruments – objects capable of being used to cause serious injury when used to hit, including:

- baseball and softball bats
- clubs and batons, such as billy clubs blackjacks and night sticks
- martial arts equipment

(f) explosives and incendiary substances and devices – explosives and incendiary substances and devices capable, or appearing capable, of being used to cause serious injury or to pose a threat to the safety of aircraft, including:

- ammunition
- blasting caps
- detonators and fuses
- replica or imitation explosive devices
- mines, grenades and other explosive military stores
- fireworks and other pyrotechnics
- smoke-generating canisters and smoke-generating cartridges
- dynamite gunpowder and plastic explosives

Liquids, aerosols and gels

In accordance with Regulation (EU) No. 2015/1998 effective since 5 November 2015:

On flights within the EU and on connecting flights from the EU, the following regulations apply to liquids in carry-on baggage:

- containers with liquids and gel-like products may contain up to 100 ml (the printed maximum quantity applies)
- all containers must be carried in a transparent resealable plastic bag of a capacity not exceeding 1 litre), one bag per person
- the bag must be presented separately at the security control
- duty-free items must be presented in a sealed, certified bag
- medicines and special food (eg baby food) which is needed during a flight may be transported outside the plastic zip-lock bag and must also be presented at the security control.

Articles and plastic bags that do not meet these stipulations cannot be taken on board. Similar regulations for liquids apply to flights to and connections in the USA.
